Blair Atholl Rescue Team (BART)

On Meall Reamhar, the hill behind the camp, is located the BART. In this base we do a little of everything. First aid basics, recovery positions, explanations and displays of specialist mountain rescue equipment, McInnes stretchers, vacuum mattress, and splints. The team requires lots of physical exercise and great teamwork. During this activity we get one of the Scouts to be a casualty and we assess them on the hill, repair any broken bits, and evacuate them off the hill and back to camp on a stretcher.

The castle was good fun. Dating from 1269, Blair Castle has been the home of the Atholl family for over 700 years. Outside the Castle you can hear the fabulous skirl of pipes. While within, the 30 rooms on display offer an infinite variety of fine objects. Beautiful plaster work and exceptional collections of arms, china, lace, furniture, and paintings. Blair Castle is steeped in history. It is reputed to have been the last castle besieged in Britain and is home to the only remaining private army in Britain, The Atholl Highlanders. The Castle presents a stirring picture of Scottish life from the 16th Century to the present day.

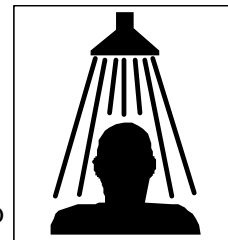

5. Walk around the camp site shouting 'Bobby'



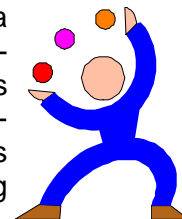
Jamborette A 'Boom'
