Any YP with allergies checked and reminded to carry emergency medication. If YP has severe or airborne allergy to food group then other scouts told not to bring this. 	2	3	6
	Inappropriate Behaviour	Scouts Leaders	3	3	9	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Brief at the start of activity to set clear expectations of behaviour. Leaders monitor behaviour throughout activity and react accordingly Leader in charge monitors timings to make sure activities flow from one to the next. All adults aware of individuals with specific needs and alternative measures in place. Small group size to minimise distractions and negative interactions. 	1	3	3
